Sidestep?

Powell moved 50bps, in line with the market's more dovish expectations. The Fed may be "playing catchup" or maybe its purchasing insurance against future deteriorating economic data. We suspect the latter, but it's doing so with the prospect of more inflation. I'm no economist, but everything we all buy still seems to cost more and more.

Long rates? 10Yr & 5Yr treasury plummeted from ~5% to ~3.75% and ~3.50%, respectively. So, the bond market already did some of the heavy lifting for the Fed the past year. The 2-10 curve emerges from deeply inverted to slightly positive. So, did we sidestep the recession or do lower rates tell us it's coming? This week's stock market seemed optimistic for a soft landing, but time will tell.

"T- Bill and Chill" Revisited

It seemed intuitive and downright attractive to everybody. After years of "ZIRP" retail investors seemed quite excited to pile millions into T-bills, hang out, and earn approx. 5%. Advisors could once again gather assets based on enhancing short-term yield. We warned however: T-bill investing is not likely to beat inflation long term, reinvestment risk is real, and what if investors miss out on an equity market rally? Yes, inflation is cooling, (but everything still costs more) rates have plummeted and the S&P 500 rallied ~30% since the 1-year T-bill peaked.

We applaud advisors who successfully used rate strategies to gather assets and were strategic enough to convert "rate shoppers" into long-term "wealth management clients". After all, you are a wealth advisor, not a T-bill salesperson.

What's next? If we stay on the Fed's expected path, T-Bill and Chillers may reallocate positioning in the upcoming months. So where do these folks go with the \$? We suspect at least some of it will enter the equity market and to us it is looking like the relative headwind of dividend and value stocks is rotating in a material way.

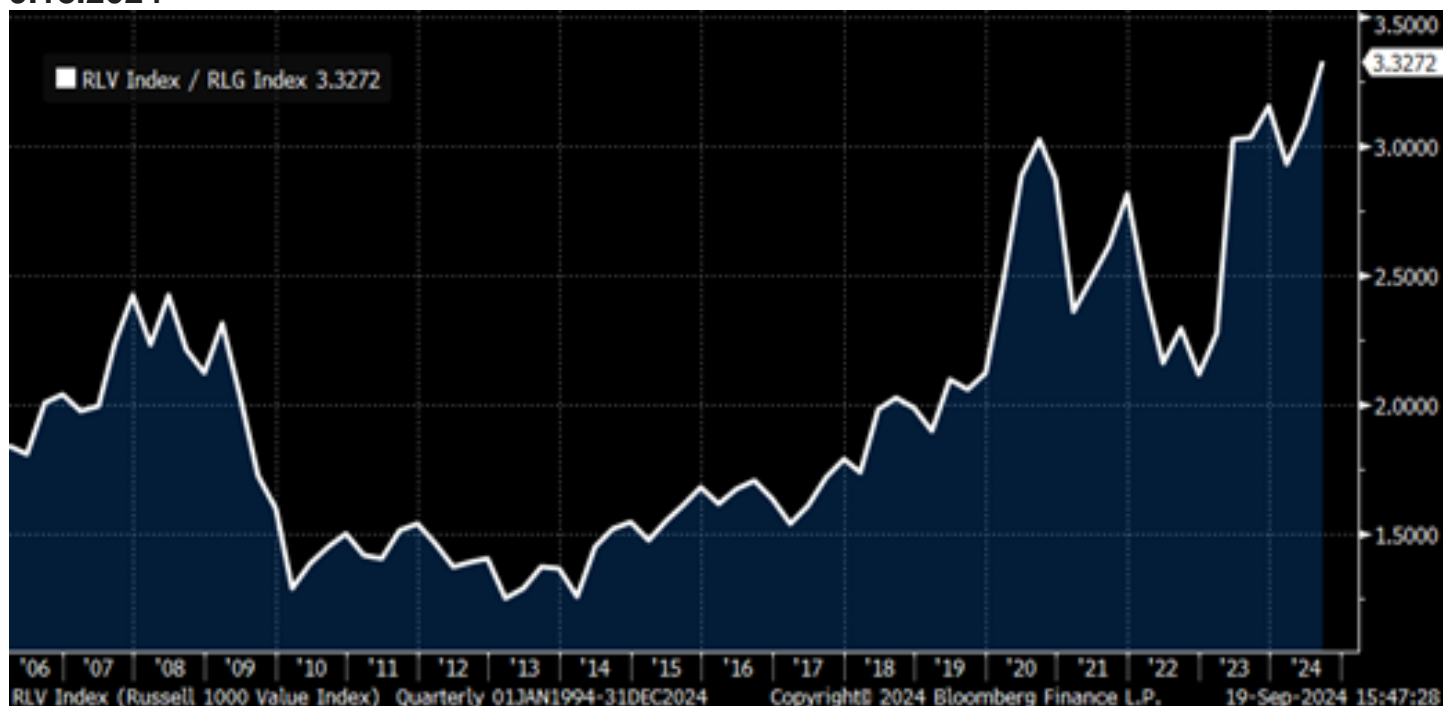
